



Stare Decisis Meets Disruption: Context is Key with AEP Criteria #18

Summary:

Procurement is being reshaped by AI, cloud systems, blockchain, and virtual collaboration, but the profession still operates under enduring legal and policy constraints. This session uses stare decisis as a framing device to show how procurement leaders can embrace innovation without abandoning precedent, governance, or public accountability. Participants will explore the promise and limits of agentic and generative AI, the continuing importance of human judgment, and the dangers of “garbage in, garbage out” when data, instructions, or oversight are weak. The session will also address how trade rules, sanctions, and state procurement restrictions continue to influence purchasing decisions, reinforcing the need for disciplined leadership in a changing environment. Innovation moves fast; procurement must move wisely.while keeping controls strong and accountability clear.
